

Wicked Sisters is set in the present, in the Blue Mountains in N.S.W. This Australian play by Alma De Groen was shortlisted for the 2003 NSW Premier's Literary Award and takes place over one evening. The three 'friends' have arrived to see the 'grieving' widow of a brilliant scientist and as the evening unfolds with many glasses of wine having been consumed, new truths emerge.

De Groen posits an ethically complicated model of loving compassion even if it is achieved through criminal means such as murder, blackmail and theft. It is quite literally wickedly funny, but also intellectually challenging.

As the accusations and counter accusations fly, the issues of morality and values are debated. This is a clever, witty morality tale.

Laughs come from wry acknowledgements of the downside of life for middle-aged women, but their contemporary dilemmas of economic, let alone emotional, survival in a world at best indifferent and at worst hostile to them, matches the computergenerated struggle of Alec's "critters" on his still-operating computer.



The ensemble cast includes Maureen McInerney, Anne Smith, Margaret Maloney and Lois Fleming; all well known to HTC audiences.

Ms. Joan Moriarty will direct with Ms. Di Mileo as assistant director, Julie Hall is the production co ordinator and Paddy Moriarty will head the set building crew. Marie Mackrell is the set designer, Simon Dixon will design the lighting and Tim McLaughlan will be in charge of the sound.

Side Man

For those who may not know who or what a 'sideman' was, well it's a musician who played back up to a 'star' bandleader.

This 1999 Tony award winning play is a homage to these men and the big band era of the 40's and 50's, the story centres around trumpeter *Gene* during the last years of this era, his wife *Terry* who as the years move on has become a frustrated and disillusioned alcoholic - the story is narrated by their son *Clifford*. Other characters are *Gene's* buddies, *Jonesy, Ziggy, Al* and *Patsy*, a waitress with a heart of gold and a strong libido.

What binds these men together is their passion for their music. It is in some ways a sad and haunting story of men not really equipped for anything other than making music.

Well how did Heidelberg under the direction of Bruce Akers fare with this strong piece; direction was sound and the pace and mood did in most respects capture the atmosphere of this bygone era but I did feel that it lacked a little passion and that some performances were just a little too laid back. This was for me most noticeable when the boys are listing with rapt expression to a tape of one of their musical heroes, with the exception of Chris Baldock as *Gene*, I didn't feel the sense of excitement that this scene should provoke in me.

Looking at the performance overall Ben Starick as the son *Clifford* brought humour, affection and great warmth to this difficult role, Kate Bowers as *Terry* gave a performance to be admired as she took us on her journey from a naïve young girl to neurotic alcoholic. Likewise Carolyn Cusack gave the character of *Patsy* oomph and a sassy endearing quality.

Chris Baldock as *Gene* acted with assurance but did not have a lot of passion and at times you did have to strain to hear all his dialogue; granted the muso *Gene* was seemingly detached from anything away from the band scene but the quietness and reticence of his character still needed more energy for his 'distancing' to come across to us.


Of the three buddies Peter Prenga as *Jonesy* came the nearest to capturing his character and was of these three the most believable; also the group of 4 muso's needed a little more comedy and a sense of togetherness in the placement of these characters – it was hard to imagine them 'jamming' in the wee small hours.


Bruce Ackers' set design was well thought out and had a nice feel about it and the lighting and musical soundtrack excellent.

To some up, an interesting but slightly flawed production of a very engrossing play, shaded by many moods that nicely allow us an intimate look at the life of these Sidemen.

It continues at Heidelberg until 23/7 and is definitely worth a visit.
