

In an English grammar school in the early 1980s, a roguish bunch of senior boys who thrive on brilliance and banter are within the grasp of a coveted place at one of England's finest universities. But can they put aside their confusions about sex, class and identity long enough to master their field of study, history? For mastering history ensures these boys a bright future.

One of Alan Bennett's finest works, **The History Boys** won the 2005 Olivier Award for Best New Play and the 2006 Tony Award for Best Play.

Other works by Bennett include the awardwinning TV monologues **Talking Heads** starring Maggie Smith, Julie Walters and Thora Hird, **Habeas Corpus** (HTC 1984) and **The Lady in the Van** (HTC 2007).

Bruce Akers, a stalwart of HTC, is directing this wonderful play. Fresh from his success with the 2010 In-House Award winning production of **The Judas Kiss**, Bruce has assembled a highly talented cast comprising HTC regulars and exciting newcomers.

Emma Hunt is the Stage Manager and she will be ably assisted by Siobhan Earley. Deryk Hartwick is designing the intricate lighting plot and Neil Williamson and David Crothers are combining to design the sound. Bronwyn Parker is working with the director in gathering the necessary furniture and properties.

The Business of Murder

It is an autumn afternoon in the 1980s. The setting is a first floor flat of a converted house in a London inner suburb. Heidelberg's wide stage gave us a detailed, conventional set. Hidden front door upstage right with a hallway showing doors to bathroom area leading into a living room. Net curtained windows at the back used for peering down into the road. Kitchen upstage left with dining area downstage. A door to the bedroom was set below the hallway, stage right, with a mesh wall, for the audience's benefit, so some later action could be seen in the bedroom. Furnishings were basic and unremarkable.

The action begins with the entrance of Mr Stone accompanied by John Hallett, a policeman. We learn that they are due to meet Mr Stone's son at the flat. The son isn't there but there is evidence of untidiness — papers, dishes and cutlery on the floor, chair cushions in disarray. Mr Stone sets about tidying it all up, in a very agitated fashion. We further learn that Mr Stone is a whistle blower for his son, having rung the policeman to report his drug dealings.

No sign of the son and, after some discussion, John Hallett leaves planning to return later in the evening. In the meantime Dee Redmond arrives. She is a well-known writer of TV detective shows and has been invited by Mr Stone to discuss a script his wife has written which had been sent to Miss Redmond. She is told Mr Stone's wife is in the bedroom and will be ready soon.

And that's all I intend to say as the plot is very intricate and well worked out. An air of tension is sustained the whole time as cat and mouse games are played out. Nothing is as it first seems but it does become evident that all three characters are connected by ... The Business of Murder.

Ben Starick, as the very odd Mr Stone, was marvellous. He had a mammoth part and never missed a beat. His agitation, nervousness and creepiness were never overdone. He led himself into anger and varying emotions with great skill. My hearty congratulations on keeping us all on our seats wondering what he was going to do next. Xavier Ryan, as John Hallett, was equally skilful in presenting a very low key, cynical policeman with a hidden agenda. His cockney accent was well done — shades of Ray Winstone! Facial expressions were well thought out.

Jessica Hutchinson, as Dee Raymond, looked good and did well with what I felt was a difficult part. This woman has come along to a stranger's flat in a trusting fashion and walks right into a spider's web. She is a good detective writer but appears to be fairly naïve.

Jessica could have reacted more strongly to certain revelations and tense moments, particularly a violent confrontation between the two men.

Lighting (Craig Pearcey) worked well. Sound (George Bissett) was also good; I liked the tense music used when Mr Stone is "up to things" on his own in the flat. Costuming was appropriate. This is a most intriguing play which I thoroughly enjoyed; a great ensemble piece and my congratulations to Heidelberg for presenting a very professional production.

Heidelberg Theatre Company In-House Adjudication The Committee felt our readers would be interested to know more about our adjudication process.

interested to know more about our **a**djudication process, so here is a rundown.

Each year HTC organises three independent adjudicators to determine the artistic and technical quality of its productions and to allocate awards for demonstrated expertise in direction, in performance and in non-performance areas (such as design). For example, when considering a performance award, they may consider consistency and credibility of characterisation, vocal qualities (accent, diction, projection), body language/movement and timing.

Awards are made in the following areas:

- Technical/Non-Performance (e.g. Set, Audio, Lighting, Wardrobe, Properties).
- Performances in Supporting and Leading roles.
- Direction

• Adjudicator's Awards: may also be made at the discretion of each adjudicator in areas not necessarily covered above.

This year the Adjudicators will be well known to our followers, as over the years you will have seen them, or their productions on stage, at HTC: Gayle Poor, Doug Bennett and Paul King.

The In-House Awards are presented following the AGM and our audiences and those involved in our productions are invited to attend.

Our next show The 39 Steps has already been cast but you can still be a part of this great production. Below is a request from Justin Stephens, the Show's director to all Subscribers, Members and Friends of HTC.

The Heidelberg Theatre Company invites you to step over the footlights and be part of the production team of at least 10 people, working backstage, for our fourth show, The 39 Steps. It's a big commitment we are looking for from you.

So let's paint the picture: There will be 4 weeks of rehearsal and all performance dates - that's the minimum. Wow! But we need to be straight on what we are asking from you and up front.

Early this year in March many members may have seen a couple articles in the Heidelberg Leader reporting the disappointment expressed by a number of young performers following the decision for HTC Youth to take a break for 12 months. Contrary to what was reported in the local press articles the decision for taking a break was not based on financial constraints.

The Committee has always encouraged the HTC Youth program and over the past 10 years we have been fortunate to have a HTC Youth representative on the committee. Unfortunately for the 2011 year no nominations were received from the youth group. Recognising that we are committed to an already demanding 5 play season, it was considered to be too great a burden to expect our existing members and volunteers to take on additional workload. As no production had been confirmed the decision to take a 12month break was obvious.

Historically we have managed to finance the youth productions from the company's resources and thankfully most of the Youth productions have achieved a break even position. Looking forward to the 2012 year we would encourage any of the past HTC Youth members to consider nominating for committee and be prepared to forward their ideas to the play selection committee now so that our forward planning for next year's calendar can be completed.
