

Set on a remote island off the west coast of Ireland in 1934, The Cripple of Inishmaan is a strange comic tale in the great tradition of Irish storytelling. As word arrives on Inishmaan that the Hollywood director Robert Flaherty is coming to the neighbouring island of Inishmore to film Man of Aran, the one person who wants to be in the film more than anybody else is young Cripple Billy, an unloved boy whose chief occupation has been gazing at cows and yearning for a girl who wants no part of him. Determined to cross the sea and audition for the American, news of his audacity ripples through the rumour-starved community resulting in the play becoming a merciless portrayal of a world so comically cramped and mean-spirited that hope is an affront to its order. Filled with a cast of extraordinary characters and unexpected plot turns, The Cripple of Inishmaan promises to take the audience along on Cripple Billy's crazy journey of hope and discovery.

Fresh from the very successful staging of Amadeus last year, director Bruce Akers has assembled another first rate cast for you. For the second production in a row, all of the cast have had previous experience of working on the Heidelberg stage.

HTC stalwarts- Chris McLean, Rhonda Chung, Paula McDonald, Jim Thomson and the wonderful Sandy Green head the cast, with new regulars Pedro Ramos, Sam Howard, Madeleine Mckinlay and Don Nicholson more than capably holding their places against such an experienced group.

Karen Wakeham is Production Coordinator with Melanie Belcher heading the Stage Management team. She will be ably assisted backstage by Bobbie Parish, Tim Overton and Llaaneath Poor. George Tranter has come up with a very glever Set design encompassing many different locations. Owen Evans again heads up our set building team with his many helpers. Wendy Drowley and her team are in charge of the wardrobe (a far cry from the heady days of Amadeus, as will be seen); Deryk Hartwick has come up with another evocative lighting design; Rob Wanless and Mick Poor are handling the Sound along with the Director with Bruce Moorhouse being involved in technical areas.

We are all very excited about this production. Rehearsals are going very well and we look forward to presenting this modern classic to HTC audiences.

THREE SISTERS - Melbourne Observer Review

Heidelberg Theatre Company presents Anton Chekhov's four-act drama

Under the beautiful, elegant direction of Joan Moriarty, this classic play receives exquisite treatment from Heidelberg's creative and technical teams and performers. The three Prosorov sisters, Olga, Masha and Irina, live with their brother Andrei in a nondescript small Russian town at the turn of the 19th century. They moved from Moscow for their late father's work at the local Army command, but now dream of returning to Moscow to seek elusive happiness

This Russian era is a time of change, with political uncertainty and societal changes, but also hope for the future, as idealised by Lieutenant Colonel Vershanin.



Many of the characters lack life contentment and purposefulness, except Masha's school-teacher husband, Kulygin, and Irina's fiancèe, Tuzenbach. Andrei's wife, former peasant girl Natasha, changes from shy outsider to manipulative, bullying antagonist.

There is a heaviness to the narrative, but humour, conflict, romance, irony, tragedy, symbolism and social commentary are subtly conveyed by Chekhov in his masterly writing style.

Marie Mackrell's set design is superb, as are the gorgeous costumes designed by Rachael Kertes, and the ladies' hairstyles. Emma Fox's lighting design, and Bruce Moorhouse's sound, artistically complement the visual elements.

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The wonderful cast includes Maree Barnett (Masha), Cat Jardine (Olga), Aimée Sanderson (Irina), Llaaneath Poor (Natasha), James Antonas (Andrei), Xavier Ryan (Kulygin), Barry Lockett (Vershinin), Pedro Ramos (Solyony), Laurie Jezard (Chebutykin), Sam Howard (Fedotik), Julian Adams (Rod), Raymond Martini (Tuzenbach), Mick Poor (Ferapont) and Frances Hutson (Anfisa).

Morgan Thomas-Connor commendably creates a definable presence as the Maid, even with minimal dialogue.

Critically speaking, some atmospheric laughter and chatter risks drowning out other characters' dialogue. Congratulations to Heidelberg Theatre Company and all involved with this first class production.

THREE SISTERS - Victorian Drama League Review

As one of Chekhov's best known plays, The **Three Sisters**, a classic in the world of theatre, was given full justice by this HTC production. Joan Moriarty has assembled an excellent cast and crew to achieve success in a play which throws up many challenges. Beautifully set by Marie Mackrell, and costumed by Rachael Kertes (with her wardrobe ladies) and acted by a very strong cast, this production was a triumph.

On entering the auditorium, one was met with a set encompassing the full width of the Heidelberg stage. A drawing room of elegance with a view through the full length windows/doors across the back of the stage to a beautiful garden setting which took one's eye into the distant view of the estate. Set with a grand piano, chaise lounge, armchair, table and chairs, and enhanced with flowers and later with beautiful and impressive candelabra, the vision was of wealth and tasteful decor. This was the opening scene which, in subsequent acts, was to mirror the fortunes of the family by gradually deteriorating. The same subtle overtones were also seen in the costuming of the women, with the sisters' dressing becoming more sombre, and the up-and-coming "lady of the house" becoming lighter. Every detail of this production was subtle and authentic.

Chekhov wrote of a period of upheaval in Russia when the upper classes were being overwhelmed by the rising bourgeoisie and industrialisation. However, his plays and themes are as relevant today as they were at the beginning of the 20* Century. Does human nature really change? We humans may have choices we can make, but we are always at the mercy of happenings beyond our control.

The play centres on the three sisters Prosorov: Olga, Masha and Irena, who place their hopes on their brother Andrei, who was to complete his studies and become a professor. They would then sell their inheritance, the property, and return to Moscow. Unfortunately, their plans are completely dashed by their brother succumbing to the charms of a local girl, Natasha, and marrying her. Furthermore he mortgages their property in order to repay his debts from gambling. Trapped in a life in a provincial town where they endure boredom and ugliness, their only relief is in entertaining the officers of the local army barracks where they can mingle with their "own kind".

The play provides the audience with the hopes and dreams of the characters, and deals with the acceptance of their current suffering as the means of making a better future for later generations. A very wordy play, credit must be given to the director and her actors in bringing to life very difficult passages. Hearts are worn on the sleeve and the dialogue can be difficult to master.

Outstanding in this was Barry Lockett as Lieutenant-Colonel Vershinin. The philosopher, the concerned father, the passionate and tender lover and the dutiful husband were all portrayed with utmost integrity. Congratulations!

The three sisters themselves were beautifully cast, and the overall impression was of the rapport between them. Cat Jardine played Olga with a compelling portrayal as the older sister on whom so much of the responsibility of the family rested. Maree Barnett played Masha, the middle sister, and Aimee Sanderson played the youngest sister, Irena, and what lovely performances they were. All three actors were able to convey so convincingly the quicksilver moods: laughter followed by tears, hope and despair. Body language, nuances of the dialogue, gestures were. all beautifully illustrated but I think the most wonderful aspect was the closeness of the sisters as a family and this was so convincingly portrayed.
